Embracing True Discipleship



Isaiah 60:1-3, John 8:28-32

- This is the Year to Rise Up and Reach Out! There has never been a better moment and a better season than right now.
- This is a season of growth, but with growth comes with its own unique set of challenges.
- We must not be afraid of the moment nor the challenges that are before us.
- Let's rise up and reach out by embracing our challenges with a singular focus on Christ Jesus. (Hebrews 12:1-2)
- Let's rise up and reach out by embracing Christ's message, mission and passion with a joyful heart to see people lives transformed for Christ.
- What is the Biblical definition of the word "arise?
- 1. The word "arise" means to rise, to stand up, to be stirred up, to awake, to be in a state of readiness or to prepare for action (call to service).
- 2. It is synonymous to the word to proceed, to come forth, to follow, to spring forward, to soar, to emerge, to grow, to come to light, and to develop.
- 3. The word "arise" can also mean or indicate new seasons, increase, overflow, enlargement or expansion of territory. (Joshua 1:1-9)
- Purpose: To ensure that every member is equipped and ready to assist us in making disciples of Jesus Christ.
- Goal: To grow in our understanding of discipleship as we prepare our hearts for the harvest that God is sending.
- Spiritual Principles: Authority, Obedience, Stewardship, Agreement, Grace, Faith

- A. Discipleship and evangelism do go hand and hand. (Matthew 28:19-20)
- The Process of discipleship and evangelism can become non-existent when believers begin to focus more upon the things of the world than Jesus Christ.
- There are Three areas that every believer must guard against:
- 1. Distractions: Don't allow distractions to cause your heart to be filled with doubt and unbelief. Keep your eyes set on Jesus Christ. (Colossians 3:2)
- 2. Deception: This is an hour of great deception. Stay grounded in Jesus Christ and His Word. (Psalm 119:105)
- 3. Discouragement: Remember you are not alone. God will never abandon you. (John 14:27, Hebrews 13:5-6)
- There were Three (3) D's that we must remember this year as we "Rise Up and Reach Out."
- **1.** Stay devoted to God.
- 2. Stay disciplined. (to prayer, fasting, studying of the Word of God)
- 3. Stay away from anything that will distract you from the mission of Jesus Christ.
- B. The Believer must embrace the ABC's of Discipleship.
- 1. They will embrace the Great Commission. (Matthew 28:18-20)
- 2. They will embrace the Holy Spirit. (Acts 1:8, John 14:16-17, 16:13-14)
- 3. They will embrace Evangelism. (Acts 2:41-47)
- 4. They will embrace the urgency of Christ to reach the lost with the gospel message. (John 4:34-35)
- 5. They will embrace the Word of God. (Hebrews 4:11-13)
- 6. They will embrace Prayer. (Luke 18:1, 1John 5:14-15, Matthew 6:6-8)
- 7. They will embrace Praise and Worship. (Psalm 95:6)

- C. We must Embrace that God created us to thrive and not just survive. (John 10:10)
- 1. Before God brought man into existence, He made sure that everything around them was flourishing, in abundance, overflowing, and fruitful. (Genesis. 1:1-31, 2:4-25)
- God gave Adam "dominion" (stewardship, administrator, manager) over everything He had created. (Genesis 1:26-28, Psalms 8:4-8)
- God gave Adam the responsibility to name all the animals Whatever Adam named them that was their name. (Genesis 2:19-20)
- God didn't bring Adam and Eve into a world of chaos and dysfunction. Everything they needed was right there in the Garden. (Genesis 1:1-2, 2:8, 15)
- God brought them into a world that was organized and everything that He created; it brought glory and honor to Him. (Genesis 1-2)
- 2. God created everything with purpose and ability to excel in its environment.
- Fish are given a body of water (rivers, lakes, oceans) to excel in.
- Plants and trees are given soil to excel in.
- Birds are given the air in the sky to excel in.
- Believers are given the local church to excel in (to be equipped for the work of Jesus Christ) (Ephesians 4:11-16)
- 1) The local church is the environment God has created to assist new converts in the transformation process of growing from spiritual immaturity to spiritual maturity.
- 2) The local church is there to assist them in the process of becoming a disciple and true follower of Jesus Christ.
- D. We must Embrace what Jesus called us to be. (Matthew 5:13-16)
- (vs. 13) "You are the salt of the earth..."
- 1. Jesus says, "You are" the salt of the earth."
- Notice Jesus didn't say, "You have the option of being the salt of the earth."

- Jesus makes it very clear that being "salt" of the earth is not an option. "Jesus said to His disciples, "You are the salt of the earth." (vs. 13)
- If you are a born-again believer and enjoy Christ's wonderful gift of salvation, then you are the salt of the earth.
- Jesus Christ uses "salt" as a metaphor to describe the life and witness of a believer. What are some of the characteristics of salt? (Matthew 5:13-14)
- a. We are the salt of the earth. (Matthew 5:13)
- There are some of the disciples who were experienced fishermen by trade, were very familiar with this metaphor that Christ was using.
- In Jesus' day, refrigeration did not exist, so the fish that were caught would quickly spoil and rot unless it was packed in salt.
- The skilled fishermen would pack the fish in salt, which allowed them to safely store the fish and use it as needed.
- b. Salt is distinctly different. By nature, and by purpose it is different. So it is true with every true believer. (2 Corinthians 6:17-18)
- Believers are called and designed (made) to be salt of the earth.
- c. There are several characteristics of Salt:
- Salt preserves. It keeps things from going bad and decaying. It cleanses and disinfects. (1 Peter 1:22-25)
- Salt penetrates. It inserts a new quality, substance and life. It changes that upon which it is put or applied. (Ephesians 4:24)
- Salt flavors. It influences the taste of things. It takes a bland, tasteless food and makes it enjoyable. (Galatians 5:22-23)
- Salt induces thirst. As believers the quality of our lives should make people want what we have which is Jesus Christ. (John 4:15)
- Salt that becomes tasteless or loses its flavor is good for nothing (vs. 13).
- d. Jesus asked the question, "How shall it be seasoned?" In other words, how can its saltiness be restored. (vs. 13)
- Jesus knew the significance of salt as a preserving agent was critical to preserving food.

- Jesus gives a very clear warning to believers, "Salt that has lost its flavor or taste, is good for nothing, except to be thrown out and trampled under the foot of men."
- Jesus knew there was nothing worse than salt that had lost its usefulness or effectiveness.
- (vs. 14-16) Jesus says, "You are the light of the world..."
- 1. Jesus says, "You are" the light of the world."
- Notice Jesus didn't say, "<u>You have</u>" the option of being the light of the world."
- 2. What are some the characteristics of light and how Christ uses it as a metaphor to describe the life and witness of a believer?
- The Greek word "light" is used similar to the word "beacon".
- The believer's life should be used as a "beacon" that shines bright like a lighthouse that lights up the ocean waters.
- The believer's life should be a steady reflection and illumination of Jesus Christ both in our life and witness in the world.
- God wants to use every one of His children like a beacon of light from a lighthouse – to show people to Jesus Christ. (Philippians 2:15)
- a. God is light and there is no darkness in Him. (1 John 1:5-10)
- The light of Jesus Christ should radiate from the life of every true disciple of Jesus Christ.
- God brought us out of darkness into His marvelous light. (1 Peter 2:9)
- 3. We are the light of the world. The purpose of light is to shine and to drive away darkness.
- The world needs the light of Jesus Christ because it has the power to pierce through spiritual darkness.
- What is the purpose and characteristic of light?
- Light is clear and pure. It is clean, that is good, right, and true. (Eph. 5:8-9)
- Light penetrates. By nature, it cuts through and eliminates darkness. (1 Thess. 5:5)
- Light enlightens. It enlarges a person's vision and knowledge of an area. (John 12:35)
- Light reveals. It opens up truth of an area, a whole new world, and it clears up the way to the truth and the life. (John 14:6)

- Light guides. It directs the way to go, leads along the right path. (John 12:46)
- Light strips away the darkness. (John 3:19-20)
- Light warns. It warns of dangers that lie ahead in a person's path. (Ephesians 3:11-14)
- Light protects. It protects a person from the dangers of darkness, from stumbling, falling, and injuring himself. (Romans 13:12)
- E. We must Embrace what Jesus expects us be. (1 Peter 2:9-10)
- 1. We are a chosen generation. (1 Peter 2:9-10, John 15:16, Ephesians 1:3-5)
- 2. We are a royal priesthood.
- 3. We are a holy nation.
- 4. We are a peculiar people.
- F. We must Embrace how Jesus expects us to walk.
- 1. To walk worthy of our calling. (Ephesians 4:1-3)
- 2. To walk in a manner pleasing to God. (Colossians 1:10)
- 3. To walk in love. (Ephesians 5:1-2)
- 4. To walk as children of light. (1 John 1:7, John 8:12, Ephesians 5:8, Matthew 5:16)
- 5. To walk in the newness of life. (Romans 6:4)
- 6. To walk wisely. (Ephesians 5:15-16, Proverbs 13:20-21)
- 7. To walk in total dependency upon God. (Proverbs 3:5-7)
- 8. To walk in truth. (Psalm 86:11, 2 John 1:6)
- 9. To walk according to the Holy Spirit. (Romans 8:1-4)
- 10. To walk in integrity. (Proverbs 20:7, 4:14, 2:7)
- 11. To walk upright before God. (Hebrews 11:6)
